MUNICIPAL PROTECTED AREAS PROGRAM In partnership with ACLT and RMN (QC), LTABC is pleased to participate in this program coordinated by Nature Canada. Designed to encourage municipalities to enter conserved lands in CPCAD (Canadian Protected and Conserved Areas Database) LTABC will be developing a program to encourage tax incentives and funding at the municipal level.

CANADIAN LAND TRUST STANDARDS & PRACTICES

The Alliance is undertaking a major redesign of this online self-assessment tool. Once launched it will be available nation-wide in partnership with ACLT, OLTA and RMN.



NATURE ON THE HILL LTABC's Executive Director took part in Nature on the Hill in March meeting with MP's and government officials in Ottawa to promote land trusts.

ACLT Through a partnership agreement, land trusts in BC and Alberta receive membership in The Alliance of Canadian Land Trusts. An important voice nationally, ACLT has been instrumental in the development of the Land Trust Conservation Fund, a national Summit and other initiatives. aclt-acoc.ca

OUTREACH A cornerstone of LTABC is outreach through our e-news and social media. Reaching more than 11,000 people annually the Alliance highlights land trusts and conservation activities across the province.

WEBINARS The Alliance offered 6 webinars free to members in 2023 on topics ranging from Indigenous Engagement, Insurance, Fundraising and Carbon Offsets.

OPERATING FUND The Board of LTABC established an Operating Fund (equal to 3-months) to ensure the long term stability of the Alliance.

STRATEGIC PLAN LTABC's Board met and updated the Alliance's Strategic Plan through 2027.

LTCF With two representatives on the ACLT Board, LTABC continues to actively support and promote the Land Trust Conservation Fund. Administered by WHC (Wildlife Habitat Canada) land trusts in BC have benefited significantly through this federal government initiative under the Nature Fund.

INSURANCE & BENEFITS LTABC continues to provide an insurance program to more than 45 land trusts and an employee benefits program to 8 organizations.
